Abstract

The Bhagavad Gita is a literary composition presented in the form of a dialogue between Krishna and Arjuna, taking place on the battlefield of Kurukshetra. Arjuna experienced a profound emotional impact upon witnessing his own kin turn adversaries on the battlefield. The Bhagavad Gita is delivered on the battlefield as a means of inspiring him. According to Lord Krishna, he conveyed a message to Arjun. The text in question is widely regarded as the most significant scripture within the realm of Vedic philosophy. In the Bhagavad Gita, the interpretation of Education is infused with the principles of Karma Yoga, Gnana Yoga, and Bhakti Yoga. The Bhagavad Gita is a sacred Indian scripture to be followed in each aspect of our life. Hence, this study focuses on the analytical review of the past researches as a systematic literature review (SLR) along with its meta-analysis and interpretation of the educational elements inherent in the Bhagavad Gita, highlighted in the scholastic representations of the researchers. The SLR pertains to the impact of the Bhagavad Gita as a part of educational philosophy, namely encompassing the essence of education, its objectives, and its significance in the curriculum, teaching methodologies and procedures, assessment approaches, as well as the roles of both learners and teachers within an educational context and finally the various approaches to leading a life that encompasses both spiritual and material aspects.

I. Introduction

The Bhagavad Gita is a sacred scripture that holds significant philosophical and spiritual teachings. The principles of education clearly elucidate that education is an essential requirement with both spiritual and social dimensions. It is the establishment and foundation of a value system [1-3]. Education is a transformative process aimed at nurturing the whole development of individuals [4-5]. This suggests that the acquisition of information, skill, ability, and insight is essential for leading a *Karmic* and *Dharmik* existence [6]. The Bhagavad Gita has been studied as portrayed in the domain of the researchers through the medium of analytical review. Analytical review is a process of reviewing the existing studies done in the selected field of research. It has two processes viz., Systematic Literature Review (SLR) and Meta-Analysis (MA). Systematic Literature Review (SLR) enables the gathering of appropriate information relating to a specific subject matter while adhering to specified eligibility criteria in order to address the stated research questions [7-8]. Meta-analysis is a systematic approach that generates information from several research projects, including both qualitative and quantitative methodologies, in order to generate new knowledge. Meta-analysis is a method of statistical analysis that employs precise metrics, such as effect sizes, to quantify the size of associations between variables among the studies contained in the study [9-11]. It can be descriptive and inferential in its process.

II. Objectives of the Study

The present study has aimed to analyse the following points:

1. To study the existing literature for identifying the key principles of the Bhagavad Gita useful in educational theory and practice.

- To categorize the sources for establishing a systematic literature review and meta-analysis.

III. Method

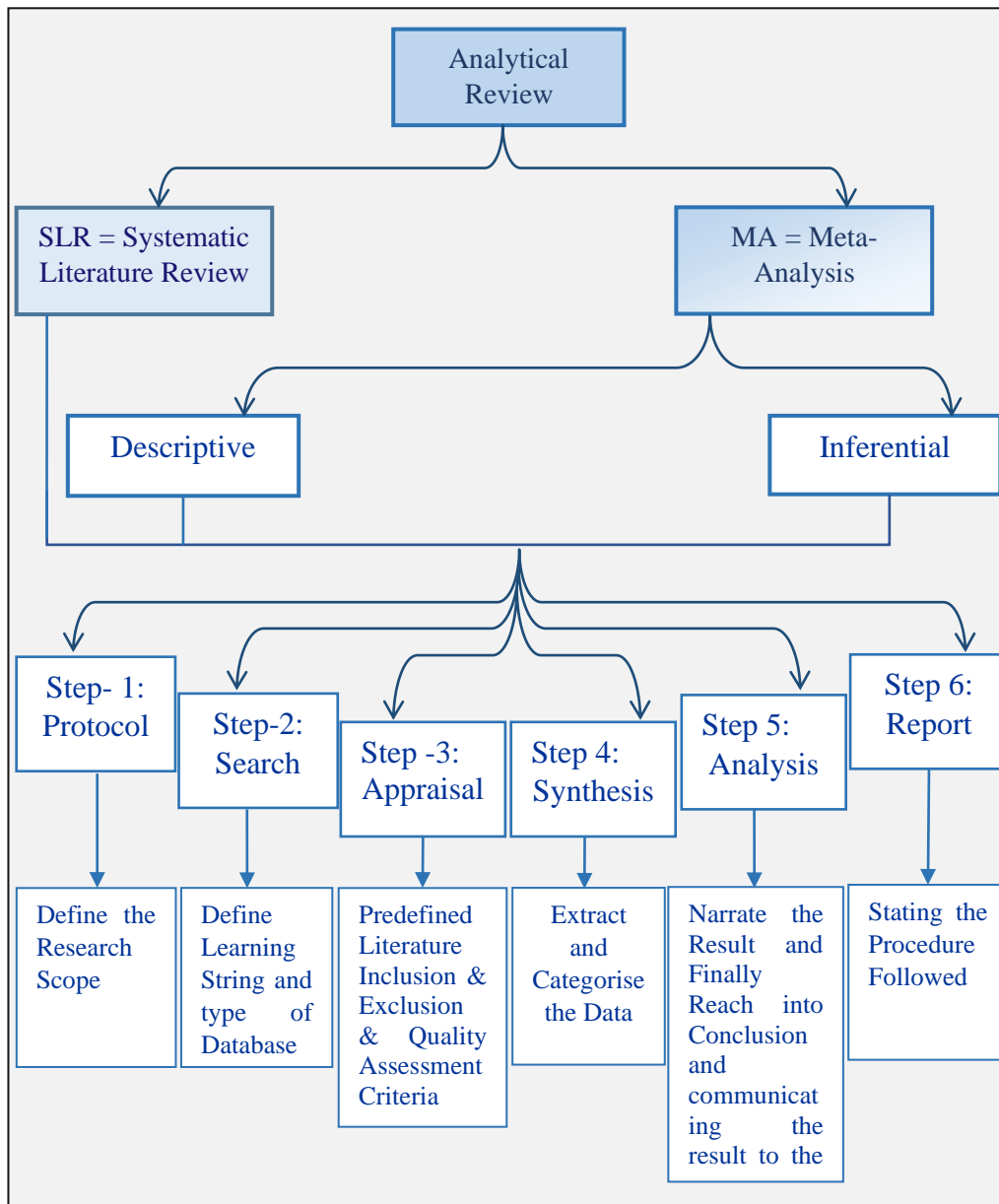


Fig. 1. Analytical Review Framework (PSALSAR)

In the present study, a review is done by applying PSALSAR model. As per Mengista et al. (2020) [9] the acronym PSALSAR indicates Protocol, Search, Appraisal, Synthesis, Analysis and Report. Protocol defines the scope of the study, Search defines searching string and type of data bases, Appraisal is about selecting related studies through inclusion and exclusion and determines the quality criteria, Synthesis is extracting the data and categorizing the data for further analysis, Analysis uses the steps like data analysis, result, discussion and conclusion and finally Report is about summarizing the result. A clear picture of PSALSAR model is best depicted in Fig. 1.

SLR Methodology Step 1: Protocol

In analytical review protocol is the first step for initiating the investigation of the existing studies already done in the selected area of the research. 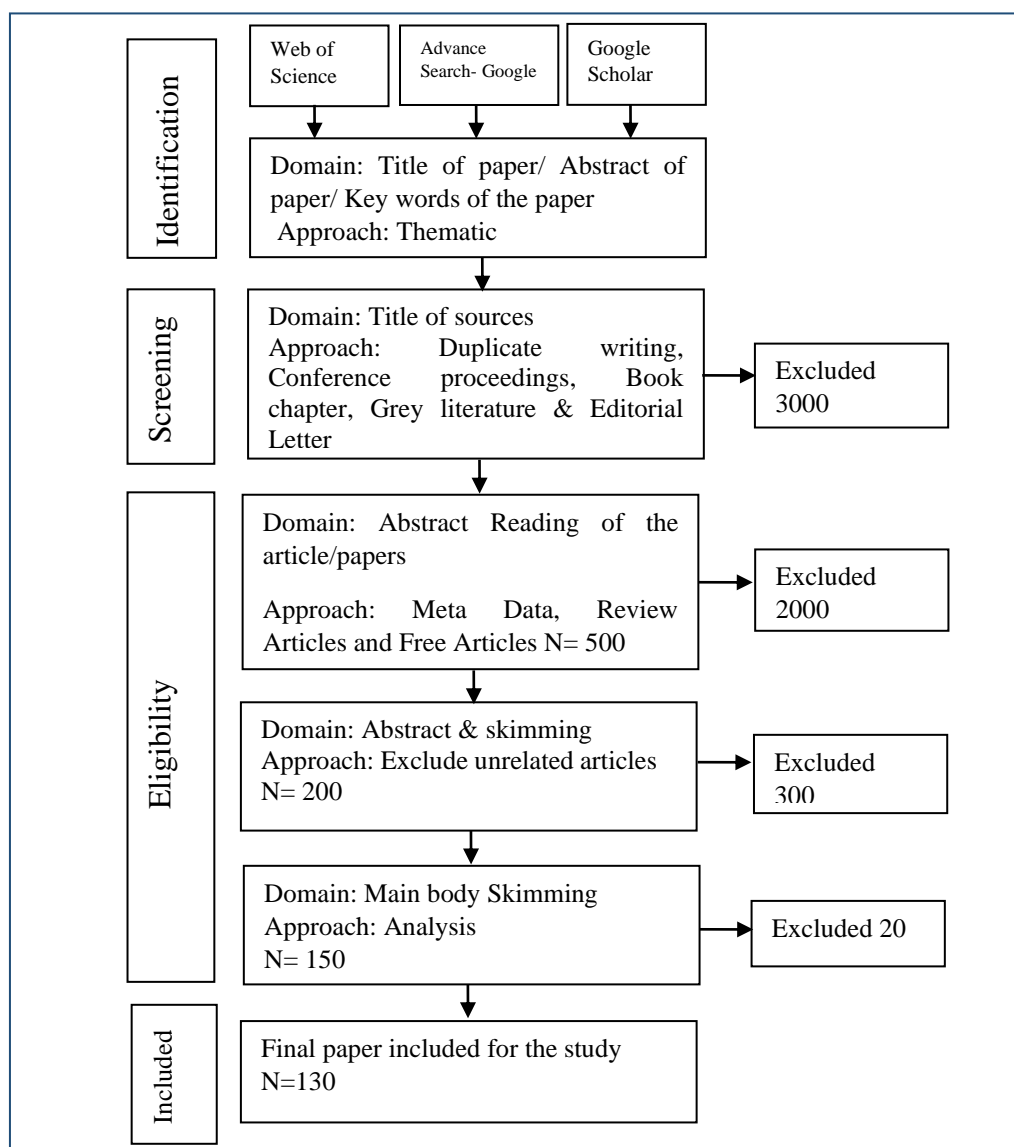


Fig. 2. Inclusion Exclusion framework

The report phase of SLR describes and presents the methods followed and the produced results gathered from the selected literature [9]. The systematic review aimed to find, analyse and summarise theoretical and empirical studies published in the domain of the Bhagavad Gita over the last 10 years (Gumanova, N. & Sukolova, D., 2022) [142]. The systematic review is executed on the parameters like domain of subject, distribution of the no. of articles, research design, number of authors and year wise publication of the previous researches or papers in the Bhagavad Gita.

Domain specific sources and number of articles on the Bhagavad Gita

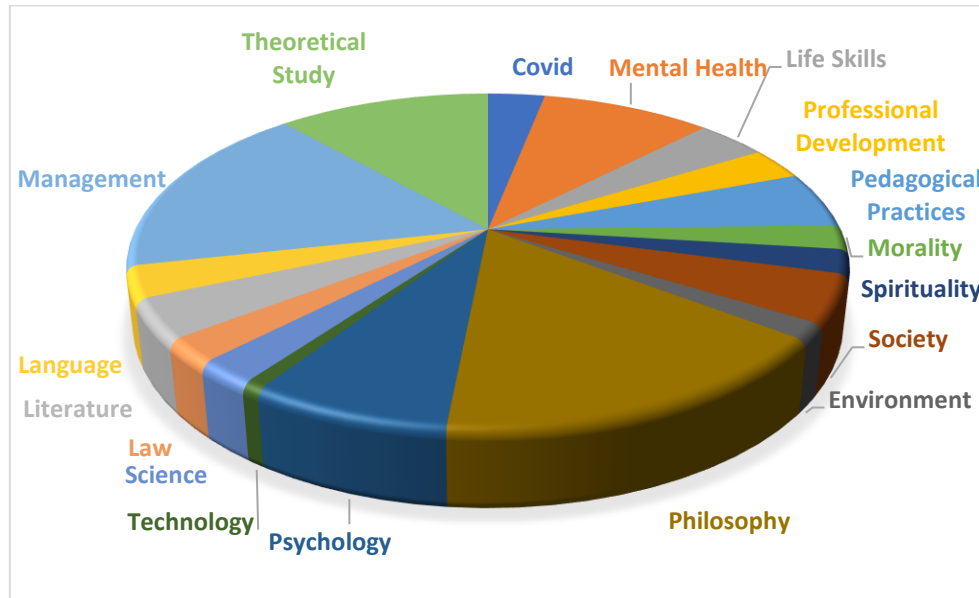


Fig. 3. Domain specific sources and number of articles on the Bhagavad Gita

The sources of the Bhagavad Gita have been sub divided in eighteen domains viz. Covid 19, Mental Health, Life Skills, Professional development, Pedagogical Practices, Morality, Spirituality, Society, Environment, Philosophy, Psychology, Technology, Science, Law, Literature, Language, Management and Theoretical Study along with the frequency and percentage sharing of the same as mentioned below in Table 4. and Fig. 3.

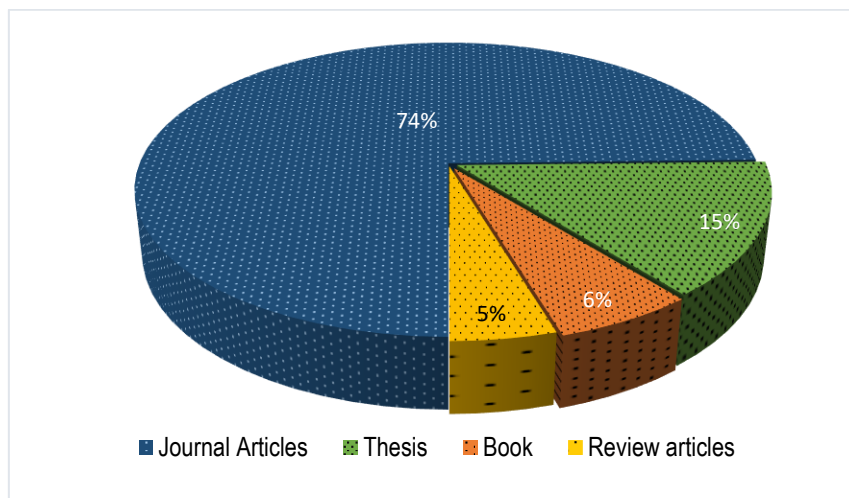


Fig. 4. Various sources on The Bhagavad Gita

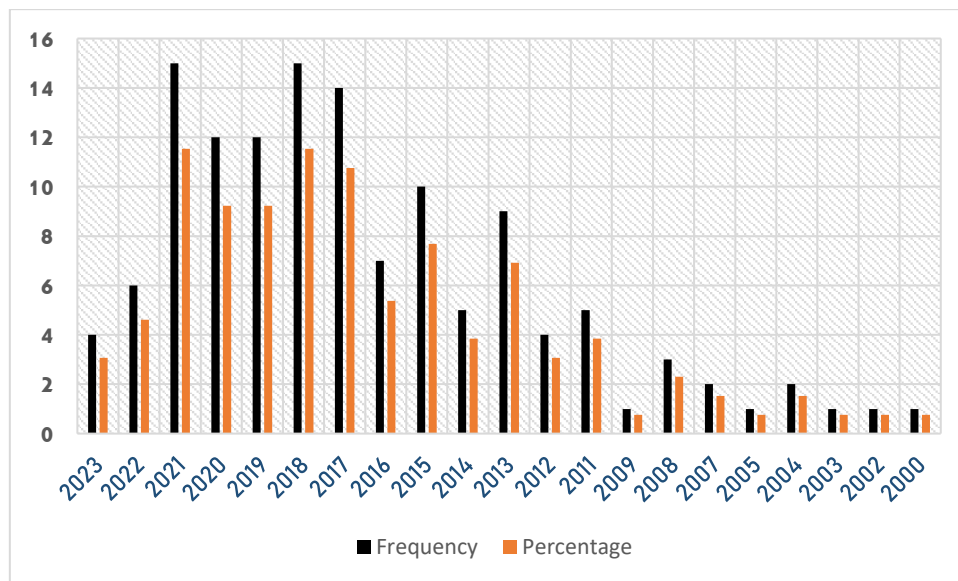


Fig. 5. Year wise publications on The Bhagavad Gita

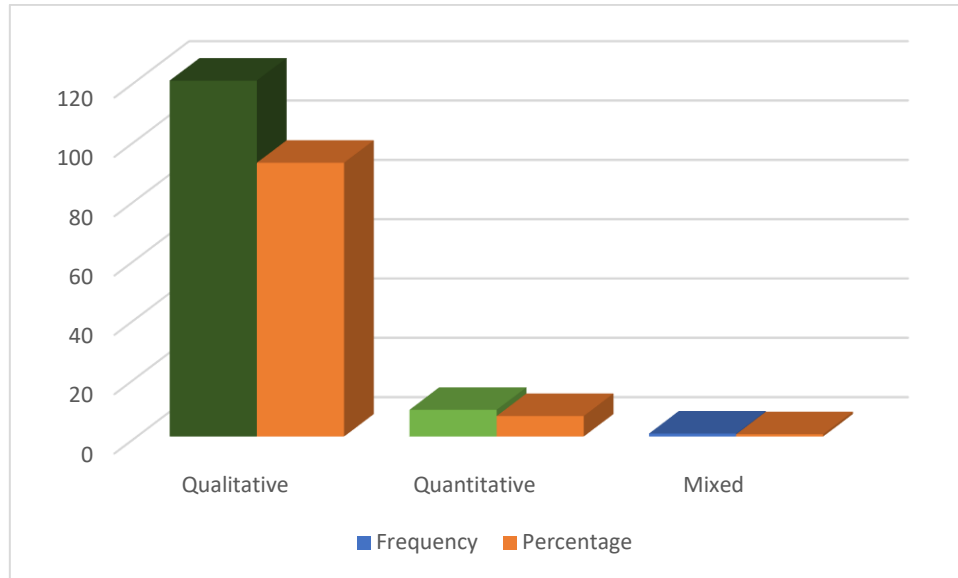


Fig. 6. Research design of the sources on The Bhagavad Gita

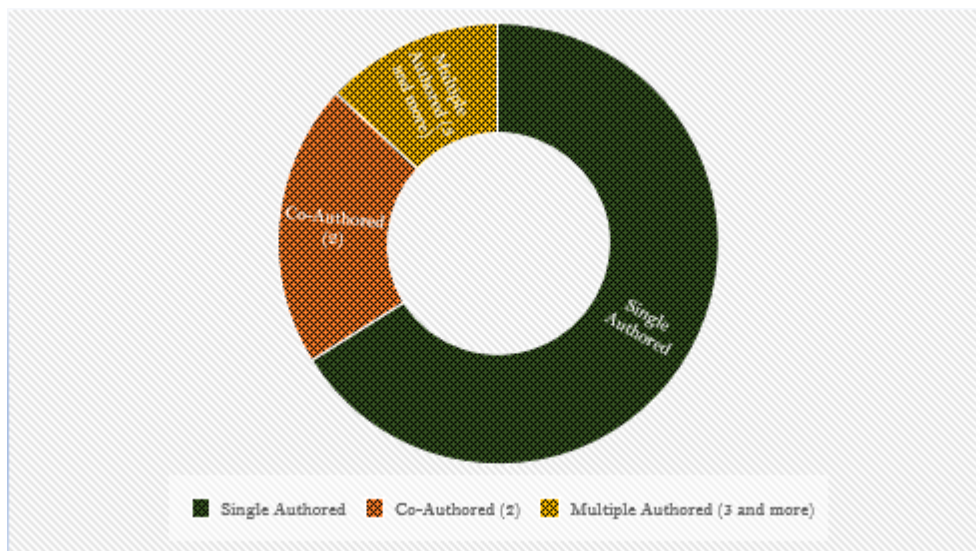


Fig. 7. No. of authors of the sources on The Bhagavad Gita

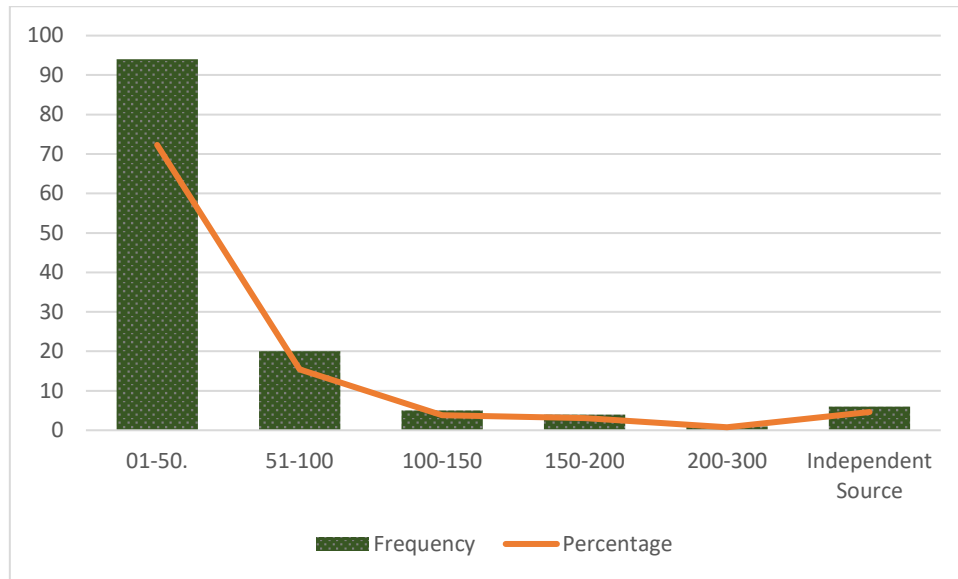


Fig. 8. The no. of references of articles or sources on the Bhagavad Gita

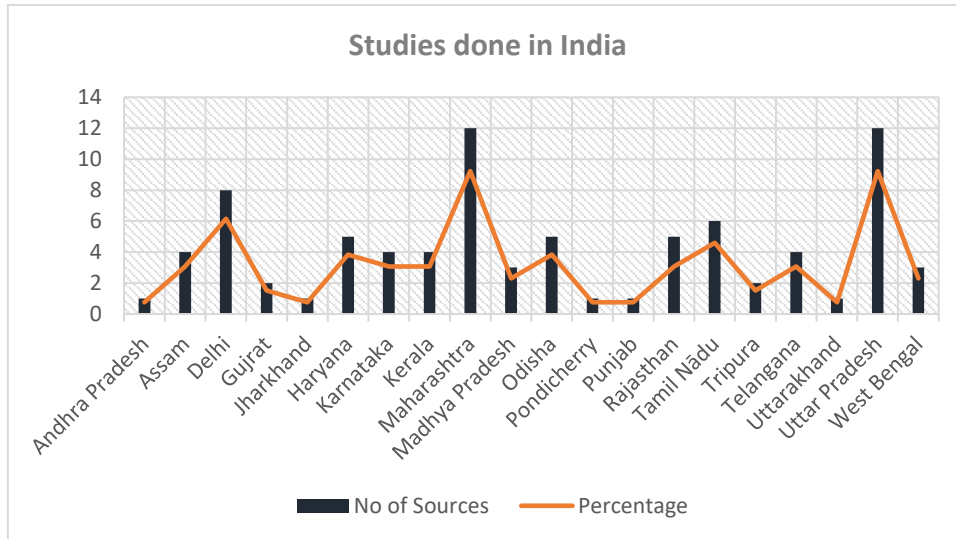


Fig. 9. Distribution of sources on The Bhagavad Gita as per Geographical Regions (India)

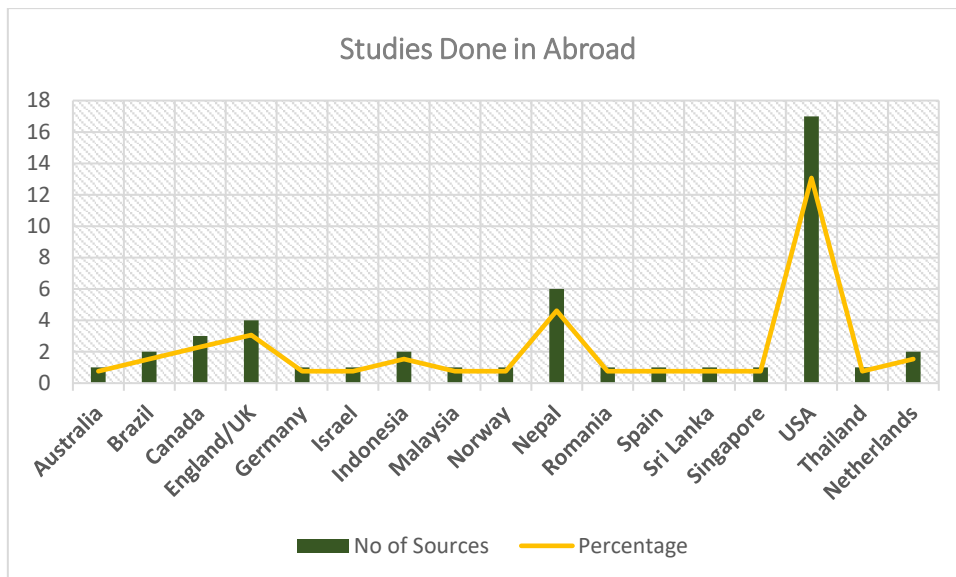


Fig. 10. Distribution of sources on The Bhagavad Gita as per Geographical Regions (Abroad)

IV. Discussion

The present study has concentrated to categorize the sources on the Bhagavad Gita to find out the relation of the principles of the Bhagavad Gita in education. The collected articles have been categorised under Journal Articles (74.61%), Thesis (14.61%), Books (6.15%) and Review Articles (4.61%). The sources have been collected form the years 2023 (3.07%), 2022 (4.61%), 2021 (11.53%), 2020 (9.23%), 2019 (9.23%), 2018 (11.53%), 2017 (10.76%), 2016 (5.38%), 2015 (7.69%), 2014 (3.84%), 2013 (6.92%), 2012 (3.07%), 2011 (3.84%), 2009 (0.76%), 2008 (2.30%), 2007 (1.53%), 2005 (0.76%), 2004 (1.53%), 2003 (0.76%), 2002 (0.76%), and 2000 (0.76%).The nature of study of the sources are categorized under Qualitative (92.30%), quantitative (6.92%) and mixed study (0.76%). The authors in the sources have been categorized as Single Authored articles (66.15%), Co-Authored i.e., articles including 2 authors (20.76%) and Multiple Authored i.e., articles having 3 and more authors (13.07%). The references of the collected sources are also categorized as 1-50 references (72.30%), 51-100 sources (15.38%), 100-150 references (3.84%), 150-200 references (3.07%), 200-300 references (0.76%) and based on independent references (4.61%). The sources

of the study are taken from the various places in India and the world. V. Conclusion

The literature review has aimed to identify and analyze different ideas, theories, issues, trends, and research processes that are commonly linked with the field of the Bhagavad Gita in educational research. The role of the Bhagavad Gita has been analyzed in relation to the educational research encompassing various domains, types of sources, objectives of the research, methods of research, tools and techniques of data collection, sources based on geographical regions and so on. The following suggestions may be stated for further researches in describing the relations of the Bhagavad Gita in education.

1. The research initiatives should be taken in the establishment of the theories empirically and in applied research.
